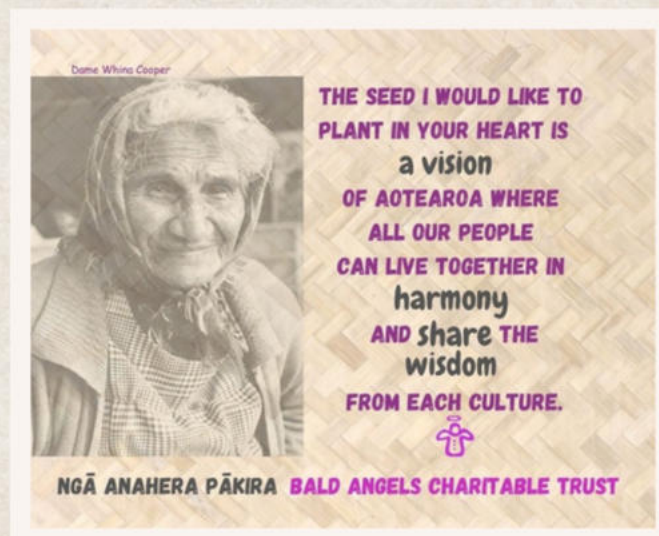

# AngelMama's Reflections –Year End June 2025

*E waka eke noa- we're all in this boat together*

Kia ora,

It's with great privilege that I, and our Angel whānau, share in the lives of so many people across our Aotearoa-New Zealand communities, more particularly in Te Tai Tokerau-Far North. Our vision is that all tamariki thrive.

This year has been one of real political and social challenges in the world and in Aotearoa. It is with humility and wonder that I acknowledge all the people of this land who welcomed my courageous tupuna (see below for glossary/translations) who came to start life in an unknown land in the 1800s and made a covenant to share and honour each other's strengths and cultures. We can't know what they all felt and understood, but we can believe there was a shared purpose to live well and raise children in a healthy and vibrant community that provided food, shelter, purpose and wellbeing.

There is no doubt in my mind that many of our tamariki & their whānau suffer from the colonisation of this motu (country). Our kaumatua, Arena, shares the tales of his 1950s childhood; how his language was muffled and his cultural taonga were shrouded. We have been blessed to have him and his whānau and friends share te ao Māori, whakapapa and matauranga with us and our volunteers over many years. Surely it is every generation's duty to create opportunities for all our tamariki to explore and celebrate their differences, skills and passions, however they are packaged- for only then can we be assured of a healthy future for our mokopuna.

In our He Whakaputanga and Te Tiriti workshops, we learned how local children were 'dumbed down' and taught labouring skills rather than igniting their capacity to explore their intellectual strengths. The social constructs that still reject our traumatised, neurodivergent and/or 'naughty' children feeds them into a broken pipeline that serves no-one. (Refer [Annual Report](#) p26) Whānau support can't be underestimated and the key focus for us has been to build capability and capacity so we can sustain and deliver our programmes with positive impact for these disadvantaged taitamariki (children and young people).

Our change strategies are focused on A) Strengthening Referral Processes to identify & support youth B) Strengthening Collaborative Partnership Networks C) Resource Diversification and E) Building Organisational and Human Capital Development.

Due in large part to an anonymous local benefactor who deeply values our mahi and the connection we've built with him, we have funds tagged to build an initiative within the kiwiMANA programme with the intention of achieving a high social return on his investment.

Strong independent taitamariki who value tika, pono, aroha and tapu will have mana. They will contribute to healthy communities across Aotearoa. Equity and inclusion mean us all having the same access to dreams and opportunity. If you're in survival mode daily, dreams can feel pointless.

I want to shout out to the people in this Angel Community who all contribute to the impact and mahi we work hard to deliver. Most importantly, the vulnerable people we serve, however they identify, who face each day with resilience and strength, even whilst in fear. They deserve respect and encouragement.

Those strengths, even though they may have been born out of trauma and basic survival instinct, will serve them well- if only we respect and encourage mana and self-belief.

More than 23 Angel Partners in social, educational, health and justice services are our connections who continue to hear and see those whānau and awhi them, often beyond their scope and with deep commitment. Our collaboration with these partner agencies connects us to communities and their needs across the region.



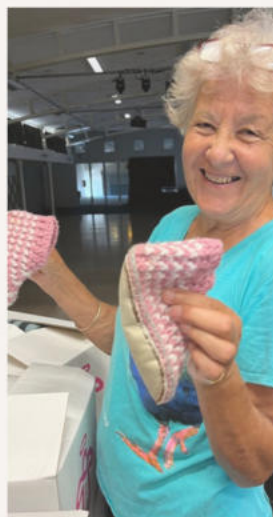

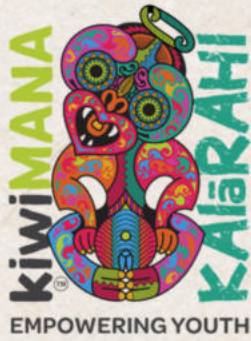

# kiwiMANA

IP: TR Designs Ltd

Our most important mahi. Where we support and empower our taitamariki (children & young people) to live today better...and create hope for many tomorrows.

We walk alongside at-risk and diverse rangatahi aged 8-24, offering mentoring grounded in inclusivity, wellbeing and agency. Many come to us carrying trauma and feeling rejected by school, home or society.

Rangatahi help shape decisions about their journey with us. Their safety and wellbeing guide every step as we look beneath behaviours to understand the trauma driving them. Building respect- of self and others is a focus, although we don't have a final destination. We stay with them as long as they want to engage.

With a whānau-inclusive lens, we provide mentoring, coaching and navigation that builds confidence, connection and belonging.

Our work is strengthened by partnerships with schools, counsellors, iwi social services, Māori elders, volunteers, health and arts services, youth agencies and local employers. These relationships help deliver mental-health support, financial and legal guidance, housing help, driver licensing, and access to sport, arts and social spaces.

We train and support kaiārahi-mentors and stay connected to national Youth Mentoring groups to ensure our practice remains strong and informed.

Our mentors often become the one stable adult a young person can trust. We honour families doing their best while facing complex challenges, giving them all the care we can resource.

Ongoing kōrero with iwi, hāpu, whānau, services, staff and mentors keeps rangatahi firmly at the centre.

We support education, employment and wrap-around care when things fall apart. We help access mental-health support and guide whānau meetings to build everyday coping tools.

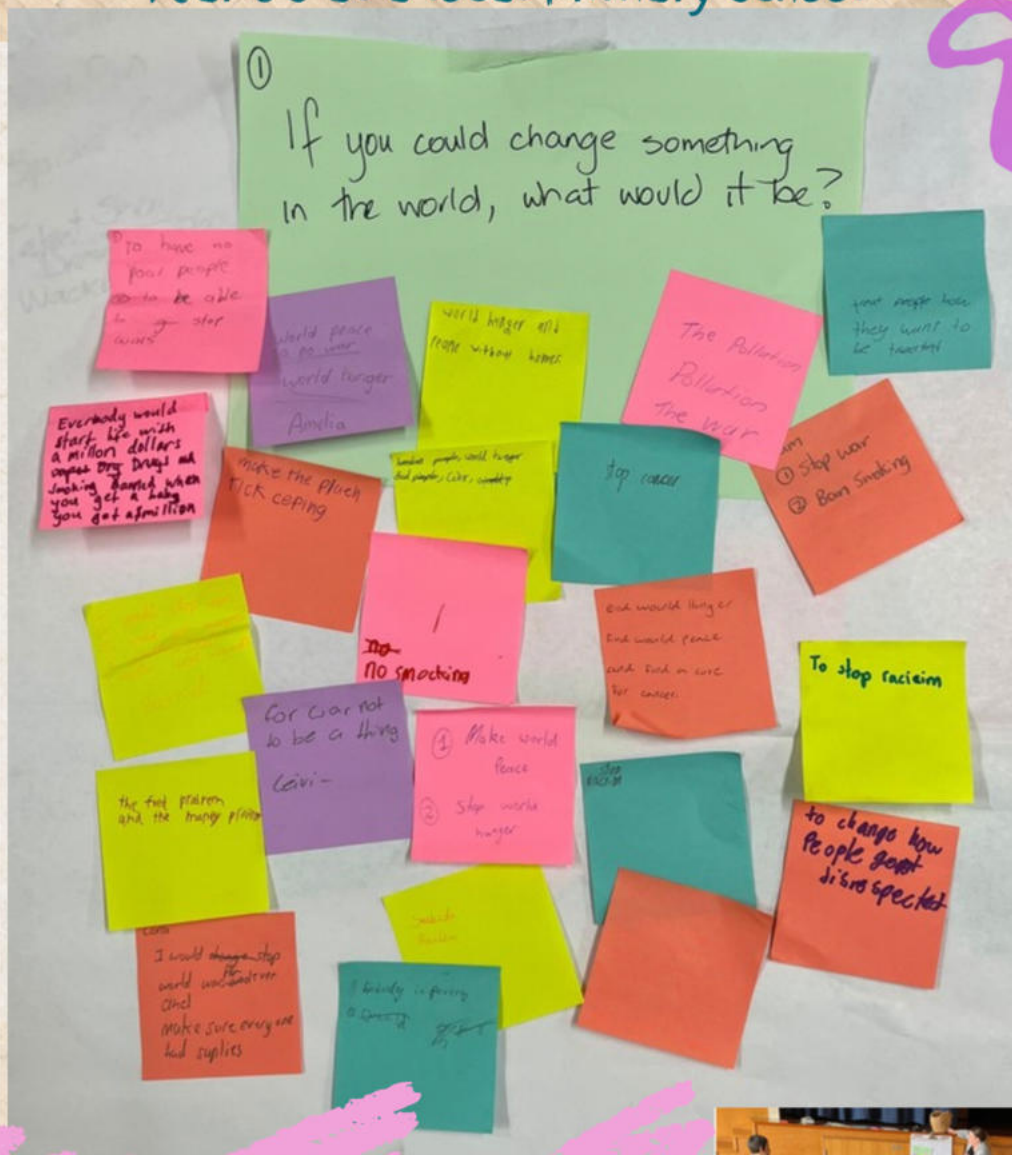

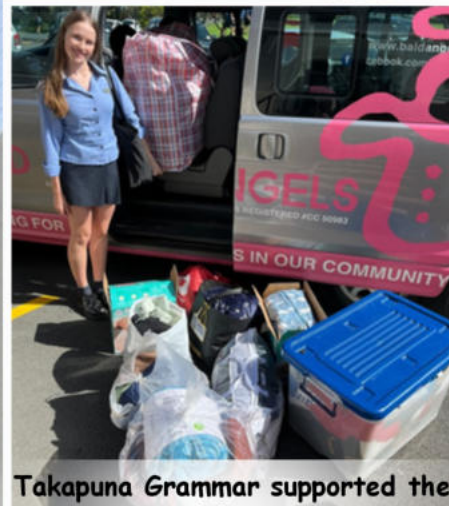

Since 2016 Angel Bears have travelled in Northland Ambulances, Police cars and Fire Trucks ready to comfort a child in trauma.

The impact is significant, according to our Police angels who say they comfort, distract and assist in times of trauma. This year another 400 fluffy friends headed to Te Pōneke (Wellington) Police.

Our social service partners use the bears in Pēpi Packs, and motivational Stop Smoking programmes.

Reflection and planning from our mid year reports

**Weekly Club meetings:** a safe space for youth to hang out, build and share friendships, engage with caring volunteers, discover themselves, find joy, feel empowered and take responsibility, experience positive values and learn respect for self and others, express vulnerability and fears in a safe environment, teach & learn from each other, protect self and others, lead & inform, connect and belong.

**Participation & Belonging:** over time it has become apparent that many of our rangatahi are neuro diverse (ADHD, ADD, on the autism spectrum +) and not always identifying in the Queer community. Having the safe space to hang out with non-judgemental others who accept diversity is of great value. Watching them develop confidence, build friendships and share joy is the great reward for us and our volunteers. All rangatahi are welcomed regardless of gender, sexuality, ability, privilege or whakapapa. We researched the correlation & have undertaken trainings to better understand & support our youth.

**Accessibility:** transport and kai are provided. All sessions, experiences and events are free. Navigations to professional services are provided where appropriate. Whānau involvement is managed depending on the needs of the rangatahi.

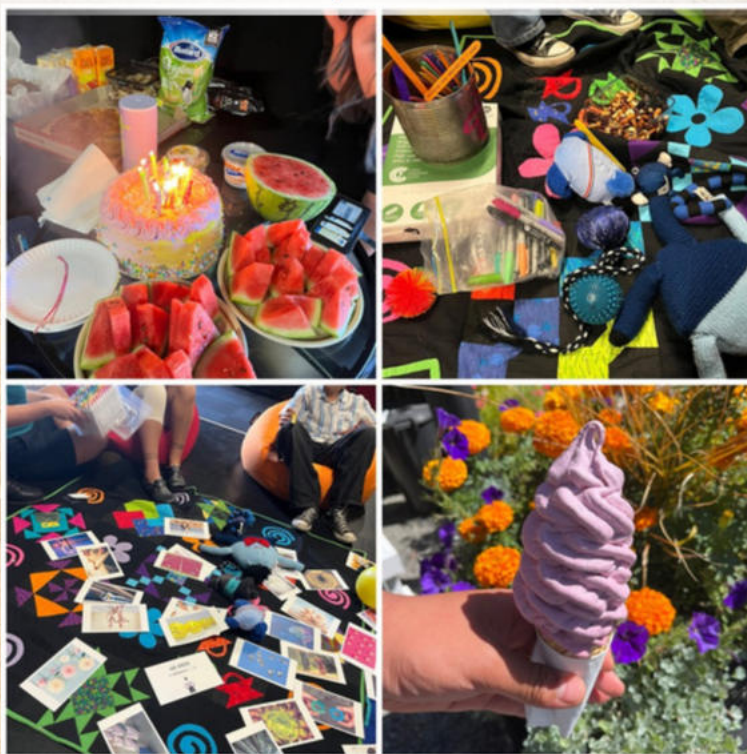
**Collaboration:** the community at large, whānau, businesses, schools, community groups, volunteers, Rainbow Youth, Inside Out, Tai Tokerau Rainbow Network group, medical practices, counsellors, adults from other communities with lived experience.

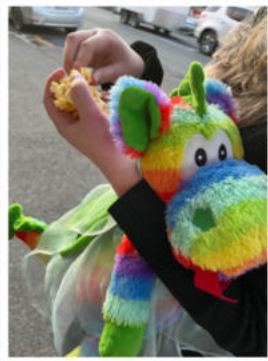

## What me? Naughty?

So many conditions and difference in brain behaviour are affecting our tamariki, and often it's layers of diagnoses, conditions, trauma, anxiety.

Neuro diversity is not the only challenge. And add poverty, isolation, addiction, and/or broken homes to the mix.

What are doing to address these issues?

How can expect them to thrive?

*"My (invisible) disability makes it hard for me to fit in and make friends."*

*"I have FASD - Fetal Alcohol Syndrome. I can't help it. I was born this way."*



## What their families say...

A māmā asked me to go to her child's school with her as a support person.

Her child had not been avoiding school and was getting in trouble when there. He's 10 and has FASD. She feels guilty, fearful, and inadequate. We

also had a medical professional present. The principal gained more understanding. Mum cried all the way home. Together, we set up a plan to ease into some routines & practices to ensure her and her son could feel safe and calm in the mornings. She said she felt so much better and was so grateful for the support. The following week he was back at school and they'd set some plans in action.



"When asked why she really enjoyed attending she stated to me that she found it important to be able to be with others that were the 'same' as her. She explained that she usually feels isolated at school and does not have many friends but the whole Rainbow Rangatahi group members are her friends. "
